Course Description

This course is the core seminar for the field of comparative politics in the political science Ph.D. program. It provides an introduction to the dominant questions, theories, and empirical research in comparative politics. The course will focus primarily on cross-national comparisons with the goal of explaining some of the systematic relationships that exist between social, economic, and political variables around the world. The course will not be an in-depth study of 3 or 4 countries (although you will get country-specific knowledge). The universe of cases will be all the countries in the world. The course is unapologetically scientific. It treats epistemological debates quite seriously and makes the argument that to behave scientifically is nothing more nor less than to adopt scholarly practices that invite falsification. I will try to convince you that formulating knowledge about politics in a manner that invites falsification is both intellectually persuasive and normatively satisfying. The substantive topics covered in the class include democracy and development, democratic performance, dictatorial rule, political institutions, culture and identity issues, civil war, elections and political parties, representation and accountability, and political economy.

Course Goals

The course has two goals: (i) to prepare students for a research career in comparative politics by providing a general survey of the field and (ii) to help prepare doctoral candidates for the preliminary examination in comparative politics.

In addition to the books listed above, we will read a series of articles and unpublished manuscripts. These will be available on the web or on the door to my office. You are responsible for locating the required readings.

Additional recommended readings are listed (in no particular order) below each topic on the schedule. These readings are included in order to help guide the doctoral candidates to prepare for

the preliminary examination in comparative politics. While the list of recommended readings may appear lengthy, it should definitely not be seen as exhaustive.

Grading

Your final grade is a weighted average of the following components:

1. *Two Examinations* (35% each). Exams will be modeled after the doctoral preliminary examination in comparative politics. You will be asked to answer two or three questions out of a possible four or five. Each exam is a take-home exercise. I will deliver an exam to you on Friday and you will have the weekend to complete your response. Exams are due in my box at noon of the following Monday.
2. *Discussion Leadership* (10%). Each of you will be assigned a seminar to lead. On the day preceding the seminar, you will email the class a set of discussion questions. Topics may include both substantive and methodological issues. In addition to whatever you identify, you must be prepared to discuss the following topics.

Substantive:

- What question motivates the research? Is it clearly expressed? Why is it important?
- What is the goal of the researcher? Description, explanation, prediction?
- What is the theory? Is it clear?
- Are the concepts in the theory clearly defined?
- What is the unit of analysis?
- Are the key actors in the theory individuals, groups, states, or organizations? Does it matter?
- What are the observable implications of the theory?

Methodological:

- Which implications does the researcher test? What is the central empirical strategy? Is it a qualitative or quantitative design? Is it cross-sectional or over time?
 - Does this strategy adequately test the theory?
 - Are the theoretical concepts validly measured?
 - How are the cases selected?
3. *Review* (10%). You will also be asked to write a review for an anonymous manuscript that I will provide. Writing reviews is one of our professional duties, and so the earlier you learn how to write them, the better.
 4. *Participation* (10%). I expect you to be prepared to discuss the research we review each week, especially the topics that your discussion leader identifies. If you feel that the discussion leader has overlooked an important topic, I expect you to raise it in class. The goal here is to learn from each other and this is impossible if you are unprepared. In order to help this process along, I strongly suggest that you bring written notes to class.
